Program Narrative

Outline the type of programs to be funded by the JAG award and provide a brief analysis of the need for the programs.

The fiscal crisis facing our nation hit the Greater Cleveland and Cuyahoga County area early. Cleveland has been referred to in the media as ground zero in the foreclosure crisis as we have recently experienced the highest foreclosure rates in the country. In December of 2008, Cuyahoga County posted a record number of foreclosure filings. Cleveland also has one of the highest poverty rates in the country. Unemployment rates have risen in Cuyahoga County by nearly 19% since January, 2008.

As poverty rates and unemployment rates rise so do the crime rates in the affected areas. Law enforcement must be prepared to respond to these new threats. However, the economic crisis has taken a toll on police agencies. The City of Cleveland laid-off 250 police officers in 2004 and another 67 officers in 2010. The Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Office laid-off 18 deputies in 2008. Other municipal agencies also recently laid-off officers.

In addition to manpower shortages, many law enforcement agencies are currently unable to replace worn equipment, purchase new technology or implement needed programs.

In order to respond to the problems facing these jurisdictions the following programs will be funded through JAG:

Job creation and retention – The Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Department will continue the employment of four deputies who will transport inmates from cities throughout the County and transport them to the County jail. These deputies had been laid off and were recalled with Recovery ACT JAG funding. This funding will allow the County to keep these officers.

System Improvements – The City of Cleveland will renovate the Sex Crimes Unit so there will be more privacy for the victims that come to the unit and a more professional atmosphere. Cleveland will also purchase important equipment and technology that support police functions. The cities of Euclid and Parma will use their funding for the maintenance fees of the regional CAD program. The city of Lakewood will purchase and install a new surveillance camera system. The city of Garfield Heights will purchase needed equipment for their detective unit.

Narratives must also identify anticipated coordination efforts involving JAG and related justice funds.

The coordinated efforts funded by this grant include the following:

Cleveland, Parma and Euclid are partnering in creating a regional CAD system. This will increase information sharing and cross-agency communication. Additional cities and other agencies will continue to be added to this CAD system when possible.

Cuyahoga County's Justice Reform Initiative is a partnership with various justice and law enforcement agencies in Cuyahoga County. It will have a county-wide impact. The governing board for this initiative is actively seeking additional justice funds to complete the full initiative. Having County Sheriff Deputies transport inmates from various cities to the County jail is one of the recommendations of this initiative.

Certified disparate jurisdictions submitting a **joint application** must specify the funding distribution to each disparate unit of local government and the purposes for which the funds will be used.

The funding will be distributed as follows:

The City of Cleveland will be the fiscal agent and will spend no more than \$50,000 of their share of the funding to administer this grant on behalf of all jurisdictions.
